

As Entertainment Chairperson for the Irish American Club, East Side I have listened to many Irish bands over the past years. In fact, I have visited Ireland 27 times since my first trip in 1994.

Barely a night has gone by that I have not been entertained by an Irish band in a pub, theatre, festival, or church. I have also planned and escorted 3 bus tours around Ireland. Each time we included Richie O'Brien and Dreams of Freedom as a highlight on the tour.

There are many styles of Irish music to be found in Ireland. (Traditional, Ballads, Celtic Rock, Irish Country, etc.) Richard O'Brien and Dreams of Freedom represent a type of music that is very difficult to find anymore in Ireland. Richie preserves the history of Ireland by singing Irish Rebel Songs. Although he does sing ballads, the rebel song is his special-ty. My husband and I always begin our trip in Co. Kerry just to hear Richie or Dreams of Freedom. We have heard him sing in the Dingle Pub since 2001. We have also heard him play at the Killarney Towers Hotel. It is rare to hear Irish Rebel music performed in Ireland very often. Many entertainers will just say that they don't sing those songs anymore. It is wonderful to see a young person want to preserve his country's history by singing and explaining the background of each song. Richie's performances are enjoyed by all ages. Each evening they leave with a little more understanding of Ireland's history.

It would be an asset to the Irish American communities in the USA if Richard O'Brien would be granted a Visa.

Hello, readers, here are a few suggestions for you this month.

The First Day: A Novel by Phil Harrison explores the aftermath of an affair. In Belfast, a married pastor and father of three has a passionate relationship with a young student. She has a son and he confesses his son to his wife and his congregation. His oldest son, Philip, holds a grudge against his father for the betrayal and his young half-brother that leads to violence.

Manhattan Beach: A Novel by Pulitzer Prize winner Jennifer Egan is a hot title. Anna Kerrigan's father is a bagman for a ruthless Irish gangster, Dexter Styles. She accompanies Eddie on his rounds and meets his boss. When she is 19, her father disappears, leaving Anna to support her mother and disabled sister. World War II provides jobs and she works as a diver repairing battleships, a man's job. At the Navy Yard, she runs into Styles once again and hopes for answers to discover what happened to her father.

In *Carnegie's Maid: A Novel* by Marie Benedict, young Clara Kelly travels in steerage to America with the hopes of finding a job and sending money home to help her family's struggling farm in County Galway. When she arrives, a case of mistaken identity lands her a position as a lady's maid to the mother of Industrialist Andrew Carnegie. Against the backdrop of the last days of the Civil War, Clara's intelligence and sharp wit win Andrew's affection. Carnegie becomes one of the leading philanthropists by giving away \$350 million in his lifetime.


Sean Cosgriff is engaged to **Crystal Moga** and planning a December wedding. Wishing you all the best, Sean and Crystal.

Bylaws, Rules of Order, Standing Rules and Customs By Tom Curran, IACES Parliamentarian

Over the past few months, several informal conversations have taken place regarding old business conducted by the Irish American Club East Side (the Club). I referenced my *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (RONR),* the authoritative directive to parliamentary procedures that the Club recognizes and uses to keep order and management. I brought my findings before the Executive Board and was directed by President McCluskey to briefly summarize the details.

Meetings are held to make informative decisions. A *motion* is a formal proposal by a member, in a meeting, that the group take certain action. It's what happens to a motion, once it is passed, that questions have arisen.

A motion, when properly presented and acted upon, can be used for general purposes such as hiring a band, setting a date for an event or spending of funds for capital improvements. These "general housekeeping motions" once executed, become void after action.

A *Main Motion* can also be used to change or amend the Club's Bylaws, which are governing procedures, or deviate from RONR by proposing amendment changes. A motion whose intention is to change law or procedure needs to designate what the intention is. Failure of the motion to state this results in the motion becoming improper and unenforceable. For example - if a motion is made to allow the Club to take a certain action *AND FAILS TO DESIGNATE THE INTENTION TO AMEND THE BYLAWS OR STANDING RULES*, the motion becomes improper and is dead on the floor.

A *Custom* or *Policy* should not be confused with Bylaws or Rules of Order. The Club may be in the habit of doing something over and over again which becomes an "unwritten" law. It become the norm, however cannot be enforced. This is called *latent ambiguity,* the common practice of an action that isn't law.

Standing Rules are administrative details and are not important enough to be in the Bylaws and do not relate to the conduct of a meeting. A Standing Rule should not be confused with Policy. Standing Rules are designated such when the motion is made where Policy is a custom or habit.

In summary, motions are made as directives to take action. A motion can be made to change Bylaws, Standing Rules or for general housekeeping purposes. Failure of a motion to be properly designated in its formation makes the motion improper and becomes a dead issue. Customs and Policies are habits and practices that although have been followed, are unenforceable *(latent ambiguity)*.




